- 1 today, this actually works really well, we promise.
- 2 | Maybe we might have to do a little exercise with

- 5 different functionality. At one point, we had used
- 6 | Zoom, but now the Commonwealth uses Teams as a matter
- 7 of course, because that's what we're licensed to use
- 8 and that may provide some conflict in some cases.

- 18 | insight on how we selected the items to come before
- 19 the Board today with the expectation that Mr. Spang
- 20 may be in attendance, may not be in attendance, and
- 21 to remind Board Members how the Bureau, the Division
- 22 has been operating in the recent past and to identify
- 23 changes in how we're doing business.
- 24 We accept new ride application packets
- 25 throughout the year, right? So there is no window

that says you have to submit them by this date or 1 2 this date. Based on the variety of rides or 3 attractions that are submitted to us, it may be 4 rather easy to review and get prepared to before the More likely than not, it's not. 5 board. 6 little more difficult and cumbersome. So we have a 7 pretty thorough process. We have a letter, it has some expectations. We have many professional engineers, Pennsylvania professional engineers that 10 we deal with, who understand our process and the 11 items that we require to see. We take into account 12 what our Board Members have asked us in the past to provide, such as electrical diagrams and such for our 13 14 professional engineer on the Board. And we try to 15 get all that information condensed to a usable product for the Board Members to review, ideally six 16 17 weeks out from a Board date, more likely six days out from a Board date, but not for lack of trying. 18

And we have a constant line of communication with applicants when we are flummoxed in that we don't have all the documents we need or the engineering letter doesn't provide the details we're looking for and so on. And then we get to a day like today where we have a number of rides that we have spent months having conversations with the

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submitter, and feel that we're very comfortable that
the Board actually has a reasonably final product for
them to review and spend their time on and offer

4 their opinions.

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So today we wanted to show you a variety of what we're working on, but not the totality in Joe's working file because that's what we call it. We have just under 30 rides that are being worked on, and they have been submitted to us from as far back as midsummer of '22, all the way up until just this summer. And for a variety of reasons that I just went over, they're just not ready to be reviewed by the Board yet. We're still lacking some piece of information that deems their application incomplete. And sometimes, as we know with some of our favorite carnival folks, you have a European ride and it's by a set of European engineers and manufacturers. And just that conundrum of transitioning all of that information into our standard causes some bit of consternation for us and our engineer.

So there are quite a few that you will likely see the next Board meeting. So if I was going to foreshadow our March meeting, weather willing, it's going to be a busy one, right? Because we have

1 many pieces that are on the cusp that we're

kind of foreshadow a little bit.

2 | interacting with the applicants, and hopefully we'll

3 | get them to the finish line for you. So I said we

4 have just under 30, which is 29, and we would like to

5 move as many of those pieces to the Board for next

6 Board meeting.

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We obviously will not provide so many to the Board that will make the day unreasonable.

But you can expect us to hopefully move at least a dozen pieces next time if we're capable. Just to

In the applicant file working, but not a complete application, we have another 22 runs, or attractions. This includes a variety of inflatables, some pie in the sky slides that may never come to fruition, some playboards that we're still questioning whether it rises to the point where we have to approve them. Some intentional major modifications, and some notifications from some parks that they plan on building things, but they're not ready to reveal it to us yet. So overall, we have just under 50 pieces that we're aware of today that need some kind of action by the Department. So your patience is appreciated.

With that being said, what do we have

up first? Angels? So, dual submission to kind of remind the Board Members that we deal with all kinds of submissions. In this case, Angel's Playground, one off. They purchase pieces and parts. They have a wonderfully astute engineer put those pieces and parts together, meet all the parameters of an application in Pennsylvania, and then it's a site specific.

So as a reminder, not only do we do
the engineering piece, we deal with the installation
at a specific location and then the overall
operation. Those are all pieces of approval process.
And there isn't another one like us. There just
isn't. The closest I can think of is California. I
don't want to be compared to California. California
doesn't want to be compared to me. So, but we do the
same amount of business, and we appreciate. Good
timing, Fred.

MR. STRATHMEYER: Thank you.

CHAIR: Just about to get into the first one. So as I described, our wayward and double booked, Deputy Secretary Fred Strathmeyer, who typically chairs these meetings on our behalf, will offer you to have a few comments and say hello. Mr. Spang is not able to attend today, but.

14 group. It echoes constantly in - in the news every

15 day. There are other states that don't have the

16 | luxury of having your expertise, all of you that sit

17 around this advisory group.

18 And - and I can't tell you how proud

19 | we are of - of this state, and your contribution to

20 what you add as we go and look at new devices and new

21 rides and - and, you know, just new opportunities for

22 recreation here in the State of Pennsylvania, which

23 obviously adds to the economy. And I really

24 compliment all of you for what you do. And to the

25 | industry in the back, really appreciate what you guys

do. You just, again, just elevate the whole process, 2 so.

CHAIR: Are you sticking around?

BOARD MEMBER: For a little bit.

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Very good. I love it when we CHAIR: can get on the secretary's or deputy secretary's The Commonwealth, surprisingly enough, calendar. especially the Department of Agriculture, we added conference rooms. We don't usually do that. don't usually add additional meeting space. But in this particular case, we are now so ingrained with industry in all aspects that we are kind of the hub of meeting all these variety of organizations. On any given day, you could come into agriculture on any one of our floors that has meeting rooms, and you'll see anything from evasive species, Hardwood Development Council, beef excellence, dairy excellence, mushroom growers, ag growers, agritourism, fish, game. You wouldn't expect us to have that, but we do have animal health upstairs and we do live baiting on top of all that. So you name it, it actually flows through here, which is extremely surprising. So this is one of many.

Agriculture is not coined the phrase, but used often, blue ribbon. There is no other

mechanism like this. I've heard the secretary speak at length and call out this advisory board as one of the preeminent boards that sits here because of the members that are on it. He may know a few of you by name, but just having folks from the industry, the public sector, the length of time and commitment that we've had, some of our members on this Board. I won't say Mr. Hall's name, but some folks have been here since the beginning, and that's 1992, if we're all being clear about it. So this has been around for a few minutes, and it really sets a precedence for us.

Jumping back to Angel's playground, the ninja course and rope course. What the Board Members will likely have seen and demonstrated by pictures is the engineer is required to tell us all of the details, the manufacturer of the pieces, the pieces themselves, the interaction with the pieces of the customers, the fall protections, and all of the mechanisms for installation, maintenance, and all - all that, really, are you wearing any safety gear and all that like. And then the owner or operator is required to provide an in depth oversight of how they're going to operate this madness. How many are allowed on it? Who is, what are the restrictions?

- How do you go in and clean them? And then the safety related around it should there be an accident. Not
- 3 just a reporting mechanism, but if there is a 4 particular hazard.

5 We've identified over the years, all 6 kinds of hazards, like the spider climbs, where 7 people when you don't have somebody in there to catch people who might get hung up in there, small children or small people slip through. They don't go all the 10 way through. Or you have a cargo net, general term, 11 and people get hung up in those because there's 12 nobody watching them. So attendants for us, not attendance, but attendants. People watching who are 13 14 part of the business are an important safety factor, 15 and often what we find lacking when we go out to these locations. 16

You should never go in anywhere in Pennsylvania where it's a free play area and there's no oversight. There's no such thing. It's not approved by us. It'll never be approved by us. So if you happen to run across a few, which Joe recently has, you pay to get in the door, and then they let you into an area, younger children have an opportunity to interact with a variety of pieces with no supervision. They won't be operating much longer

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   if we can help it. Hopefully, they'll figure out
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   that attendants are a vital safety requirement.

   It's been a while since we've had one where you've
24
   asked questions and provided insight. And we have no
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issue with going back to ride operators and ask them

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- 1 to do things differently or increase what we've asked
- 2 them to do initially during their conditional
- 3 approval. What the Bureau has done says, if I issue
- 4 on behalf of the Bureau, this is one of the changes
- 5 that we've made, conditional approval. In that
- 6 approval, it says, this conditional approval will be
- 7 | go to an actual approval within six months unless
- 8 we interact with you. That gives us enough time to
- 9 hear before the Board, but I don't have to generate
- 10 three separate letters to them, and they know what -
- 11 | what's expected of them.
- So they're in their six month period
- 13 where Board Members can comment on this, or we can
- 14 take a step back from our approval while they are
- 15 allowed to operate because we had no reason to stop
- 16 them from operating waiting for a Board date.

- I think it's not acceptable to have a manual that doesn't have a name of who made the manual. The manufacturer's name is not anywhere in the document or their contact information. If I was the owner of this attraction, I would want a manual that has the, you know, the manufacturer's name and how to contact them on it. I think that's not acceptable for your

records and for the owner.

MR. CATALANO: Yes, this is Tony
Catalano. I've been in touch with the owner. Now
he's actually trying - I just sent him a link to try
and get into the meeting, and maybe he can get in and
explain any of this to you.

MR. GORMAN: I just think for the record, I think they need to reissue the manual with their name on it and contact information. The only inspection I see is basically cleaning and then looking for - looking for - I wondered if there's a more extensive checklist to do their maintenance. That's my - that's my only comments.

CHAIR: I'm taking notes. Give me a second. Any other comments from Board Members concerning this submission? I appreciate the -.

MR. PITTMAN: John Pittman signing on. CHAIR: Good morning, Mr. Pittman.

1 Always a pleasure. How are you?

MR. PITTMAN: Good morning. Thank you very much. I had a little trouble with the code.

CHAIR: I understand. That's usually my demise also. We're actually on our first item today, so if you have any comments or questions for the ninja course under angel playground, now is the appropriate time. Thank you.

MR. PITTMAN: I have none.

CHAIR: Seeing no additional comments and having the discussion that this has already been conditionally approved, I will not ask for the opinion of the Board on this item. Noting Mr. Gorman's concerns that we will always work to update and improve our record. We'll interact with the manufacturer and the submitter and get those items addressed.

Moving on to Angel Playground's rope course, part and parcel. You may see some of the same concerns in this one, and you may not. So as an aside, just because I can, is there any feeling from a Board Member for comment? Is this an item that should be regulated by the Division? Ninja courses, ropes courses? Should, yeah. Should this be something that we are approving as a ride or an

- 1 attraction? Just getting your feeling. You're 2 allowed to have an opinion or no opinion.
- BOARD MEMBER: I agree with Mr.
- 4 Gorman. If we don't have a manual, I've dealt with
- 5 Chinese government or anything that we placed over
- 6 there. Everything has to have a manual, right down
- 7 to the last pole. It's probably okay though.
- BOARD MEMBER: What are you asking?
- 9 CHAIR: Thank you. Is there any other
- 10 | Board Members with comments concerning the Angel's
- 11 Playground rope course? Yep, go ahead, Mr. Warman
- 12 (phonetic).
- MR. WARMAN: My name's Steve Warman.
- 14 Again, I have the same comments because it's the same
- 15 | manufacturer, but it is mandatory, so.
- 16 | Manufacturer's name line or contact information. And
- 17 | I wonder if there's a we have a better picture of
- 18 this. Is there a way to constrict observers to get
- 19 in get into the course? Is there a fence around
- 20 | it?
- 21 MS. BROWN: I tried to pick up the
- 22 | best picture that they had.
- MR. FILOROMO: It's hardly the one I
- 24 saw. I asked.
- 25 CHAIR: There there is.

28 Well, I just emailed you a 1 MR. ARNDT: picture from before I was there. They have to put a 2 3 fence up now, but. 4 MS. BROWN: Okay. 5 I didn't expect anything else. Hold 6 on. 7 CHAIR: Really like when you keep us on our toes. The answer is always yes, whether we've addressed it or not, or we have the pictures for it. 10 But as - as you had heard from Mr. Arndt down there, 11 and Mr. Catalano was on the phone, part and parcel of 12 these things, some of which we're very good at, is oversight, operation, and access. Though the 13 14 documentation might not always be in the packets, 15 we're always very conscious of how they're operating 16 their businesses. So this is one that was already addressed concerning bystanders being able to access 17 18 it without having to go through whatever the 19 requirements are to get on this particular 20 attraction. 21 MS. BROWN: Is that - sorry, I'm 22 talking. Was it just one picture, Randall? 23 MR. ARNDT: Yeah. 24 MS. BROWN: Okay.

25 MR. ARNDT: Yeah, this is a picture.

- 1 Tony's given him and I were there back in July, and
- 2 then and we had him put fence up. Tony verified the
- 3 fence is up. I personally had a picture of that. At
- 4 the time, the net inside the attraction there. I
- 5 | instructed them not to use it because I was afraid of
- 6 the kids going in there and not being harnessed and
- 7 then going on the attraction, so.
- 8 CHAIR: Right, but would you say that
- 9 they're willing and making the changes as required to
- 10 ensure that they're meeting the requirements?
- 11 MR. ARNDT: Yeah, yes. They've they
- 12 made a prior statement to make changes as we've
- 13 suggested. And Tony verified, and I did get a
- 14 picture from him earlier to show that. But this is
- 15 what it looked like prior to the fence. It's a
- 16 | better picture than what's in the manual.
- 17 CHAIR: Thank you, Randall.
- 18 MR. STRATHMEYER: How does someone go
- 19 around this course? Just jump on there and just?
- 20 CHAIR: You have to ask a question so
- 21 it can be recorded.
- MR. STRATHMEYER: So how does an
- 23 occupant of the ride, how do they actually move
- 24 through that course? And the reason I'm asking is,
- 25 is when I look at metal poles and knowing these ninja

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1 courses and watching some of this stuff, I could see
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- 2 somebody knocking their noggin into those metal
- 3 poles. And those round, yellow pieces are all metal,
- 4 too. What's to prevent people from falling off of
- 5 this obstacle course and breaking a limb and what
- 6 have you? Ed.
- 7 CHAIR: Go ahead, Randall.
 - MR. ARNDT: Okay.
- 9 On on this attraction, you actually
- 10 have a harness. And there's a lander attached to
- 11 their harness. And it goes into a puck.
- 12 CHAIR: Slides through the black.
- 13 MR. ARNDT: Look at the, up here. The
- 14 | puck will slide, slots up in here around so if they
- 15 fall, they're caught. And once they're in, they're
- 16 | in all the time. They can't fall, but they can't
- 17 | fall more than a certain amount of depth. So when
- 18 they're up here, they're only going to fall down a
- 19 foot or so. And then they can kind of traverse
- 20 around the track.
- 21 MR. STRATHMEYER: So it's a harness -
- 22 | so it's a harness aided attraction?
- 23 MR. ARNDT: Yes, harness aided
- 24 attraction.
- MR. STRATHMEYER: Okay, okay.

This - this is pretty typical for indoor and outdoor,
right? Five point harness, redundant harness, or
they're caught in a track that they can't get out of
unless they're let out of, for the most part.

MR. STRATHMEYER: Okay.

CHAIR: So, great question. Ninja course is different, right? You navigate obstacles. It has four fall mediation by the balls underneath each obstacle.

MR. ARNDT: Correct.

CHAIR: So they're going to be leaping or interacting, which is why they have a fall protection. But this has harness system, as they all do.

MR. STRATHMEYER: And - and as those, in the ninja. As those areas are separated, that separation is all padded?

CHAIR: It is. And operationally, they're only allowing so many participants. So the operator will observe a participant start to navigate the course, and the next participant will not be allowed to start the course until the first one is moved past a certain threshold. And part of their safety brief in almost all cases says you will not

- 1 catch up to or pass the person. So no two people on
- 2 the same obstacle.
- MR. STRATHMEYER: So going back to

 your requirement and or necessity for an attendant to
- 5 | be present at all times?
- 6 CHAIR: True.
- 7 MR. STRATHMEYER: Okay.
- 8 <u>CHAIR:</u> Any other questions on rope or 9 ninja course or comments on it? Absolutely, Mr.
- 10 Gorman.
- MR. GORMAN: This is Steve Gorman again. One more comment on the manual. On their
- page 16, our PDF page 20, in the manual, it says to
- 14 contact RCI for information when you have questions,
- and I don't know who that is and how do you contact
- 16 them. So the manual's not complete enough to have
- 17 | the owner know what to do.
- 18 MR. FILOROMO: Steve's brought up two
- 19 very good points that we have problems with.
- 20 CHAIR: You have to turn this on.
- 21 <u>MR. FILOROMO:</u> Turn what on?
- 22 <u>CHAIR:</u> The microphone so everybody
- 23 can hear you.
- MR. FILOROMO: It's good. It's good
- 25 there. It's good.

Steve's brought up a couple of points that is a common problem we've got with these approvals overall, and it's uniformity. They - we - they leave out name and manufacturer. They - they use different names of manufacturers, different names of rides. They need to pick a name and stick with it. They need to, you know, not refer to somebody mysteriously like, mysterious like that RCI.

We're trying more and more to do this in a 100 percent type of pass, fail. And if - and if everything isn't together, everything isn't uniform, it's rejected, and they need to resubmit the whole thing. Because once they send us a missing piece of information, it shouldn't be up to us to guess that that's what the engineer was intending. The engineer is certified, and so everything needs to become complete and acceptable from the engineer. And uniformly named as far as the manufacturer and the ride name.

The other part of this is, we're now concentrating more on the data plates. So everything is, since this law started, required to have a manufacturer's data plate that identifies the ride properly. And this whole approval should be uniform with what that data plate identifies the ride as. So

- that's what we're working towards, and this is one we will definitely have. We'll follow up with. That is
- 3 all.
- 4 CHAIR: That's our little cue. He
- 5 says that's all, I know he's getting off the phone
- 6 with me. I like that when he says that, by the way.
- 7 Makes me happy.
- 8 Any other comments to Angel's rope
- 9 course? Just as an aside, is there any guess on how
- 10 many we have? How many of these type of attractions,
- 11 | indoor type attractions that we have in Pennsylvania?
- 12 Come on. Anybody in the back wan to offer? Dozens?
- 13 Hundreds?
- 14 PUBLIC MEMBER: Hundreds.
- 15 CHAIR: Yeah, we have more than 75,
- 16 | for sure. Yeah. There's just shy of 200. Ever
- 17 changing. Just to get a kind of a litmus test of, we
- 18 get inundated with these. Right? So went from zero
- 19 trampoline parks in 2007 to.
- MR. ARNDT: We're up to 40 now.
- 21 CHAIR: Yeah, dozens and dozens and
- 22 dozens and dozens. It's, you know. As people's
- 23 entertainment issues change. Another side because
- 24 | it's fun, laser tag. Amusement attraction or not
- 25 amusement attraction?

1 MR. FILOROMO: It depends.

CHAIR: That's a no, that's a no,

3 that's a no, that's a no. Anybody else? It's a yes.

4 Fixed course interaction, up and down through

5 obstacles. Absolutely. We don't do it, but

6 absolutely it meets the general requirements of the

7 law. Just for fun. Now you know why we want our law

8 to be looked at and clarified.

MR. FILOROMO: I think it's clear.

10 CHAIR: How about skiing, right? No,

11 but snow tubing, yes. Right? Go karts, yes.

12 Segways, no. Excursion railroads with, pedals, yes,

13 no? Yes. Yes, yes. Full size trains? No, not us,

14 FRA, but it could be us if it was an excursion line

15 only. We just don't have the expertise to do full

16 | size. But we do everything other than full size.

17 Yes. Okay.

18 Buckle your belts. Speaking of trains

19 and excursion railroads, Joe is going to give us a

20 brief overview of Bittler Train and why it's here and

21 | why it's grandfathered. Turn on your mic. There you

22 go.

9

MR. FILOROMO: This Bittler Train was

24 at Harvey's Lake Amusement Park, and the park closed

25 | in the '80s. And the train kind of went underground

1 | ever since then. Somebody's bought it, and they want

2 | - they're using it publicly now. And I guess the

3 | ride was never registered, or at least we never found

4 it registered under Bittler Train. But it's

5 definitely, according to our regulations, a

6 grandfathered ride.

7 So with that, we did grandfather the

8 | ride in, but we did go through the new amusement

9 railroad standard in ASTM and tried to review the

10 | whole thing. And - and Dennis helped him put

11 together a pretty good manual and bring the thing up,

12 pretty much up to modern standards. There's no issue

13 that's a problem with it. So I did a good job of

14 documenting it and putting some rules of how to

15 operate, maintain, and inspect it into a manual for

16 | it to go by now, according to current standards.

17 | That is all.

18 CHAIR: Any other comments or

19 questions from Board Members concerning this

20 submission or trains in general? Tracked trains?

MR. GORMAN: So - so, the Department

22 has had an inspector seeing this train, right?

23 | That's what you said, right?

MR. FILOROMO: Yeah.

MR. GORMAN: So my only comment on the

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whole submission is, I don't need an engineer's
letter and will we require it?
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MR. FILOROMO: No, we don't need.

4 CHAIR: No. There won't - there won't

5 be one.

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MR. GORMAN: Okay.

7 MR. FILOROMO: We don't need that with 8 a grandfather.

9 MR. GORMAN: Okay, okay. That's all 10 I'm asking, yeah.

CHAIR: Don't worry, Mr. Gorman, same question I had of Joe since this is unusual, to say the least, that we find something that hasn't already gone through a process or that we don't have hands on. But I would guess if I had asked, and I'm not asking Tim Horn to comment because I'm not opening that box, but he would - we - we have a discussion of what grandfathered isn't and there is ASTM expectation of what that is and how it's used and what continuous operation means and the like.

But in this case, I think I am in agreement with Mr. Filoromo's assessment. We went out there, we ran it through all its paces. The only thing we're not looking for is that engineer letter as it's been in existence and operational since at

1 least the mid-'80s.

How many trains do we have like this one, do you think? I love this game.

 $\frac{\text{MR. FILOROMO:}}{\text{CHAIR:}} \quad \text{Old ones like that?}$ $\frac{\text{CHAIR:}}{\text{Mell, I'm saying that size,}}$ maybe that.

7 MR. FILOROMO: There's lots of them.

CHAIR: Lots of them. Lots. And there's probably, only probably know about three quarters of them, right? Because we are ever evolving in asking folks to interact with people just because you think it's amusement rider attraction, it probably is. We may not know about it. So as a reminder to most folks and those on the line and the Board Members, as of recently, when Mr. Bukowski was hired, we added one additional inspector to what was otherwise a vacancy or lack thereof.

So now we have a total of four amusement ride quality assurance safety inspectors, and a supervisor. Before there was three. They cover all of Pennsylvania, like 840 something owners and more than 12,000 registered rides overall, though half of those are Inflatables. There's the other half are not. Right? And that's not counting the ones we're not aware of that only come out for

October and September and November. Barrel trains
and pedal cars and on homemade slides, homemade zip
lines, and a variety of things that we're now seeing
as agricultural operators now extend their earning
season by adding events like corn mazes and - and the
like, right?

So they're completely unaware that there's rules and regulations that cover some of those amusement rides and attractions that they are operating even now, or have just finished operating right now. We don't even know they exist yet.

Right? Then you'll have Tinseltown, where they're going to come in with scaffolding and make an ice slide. Right? They're dealing with a scaffolding company, laying down some plastic sheeting, putting some frozen blocks on there and putting tubes on it. Somebody points it out in the newspaper, typically, Mr. Hall. He'll - will cut out an article and forward it to us, and we'll say huh, isn't that interesting?

Or the balloon over the Pittsburgh - the Philadelphia Zoo. You know, they're offering balloon rides. They put them up on a tether and put them in a basket, up and down they go. And suddenly that becomes us because they're on a tether, right?

1 | So, magic, please tell us. We love to know.

2 I digress. Bojux Extreme. This is

3 one of those items that we have seen before as Board

4 Members. Just to be clear, it's not a surprise to

5 you folks. The last time that we met, we had a

6 conversation about this particular ride. It was

7 | related to electrical. Having a long conversation

8 | with Robert Di Domizio, Junior, our engineer. Flip

9 around over here. I think we figured it out. I

10 think we figured out the electrical works

11 appropriately based on the cycles between 50 and 60

12 hertz per cycle. And I think we're okay with it.

So at this point, Board Members, if

14 you have comments, questions, or concerns for the

15 submission for Bojux and the extreme, please.

16 MR. SWIKA: Is that - did that ride

17 | make it to the states yet or is it on its way?

18 MR. FILOROMO: We're not quite sure.

CHAIR: We haven't seen it.

20 MR. FILOROMO: We kind of think it's

21 on a dock somewhere.

19

MR. SWIKA: Yeah.

MR. FILOROMO: And Ben is kind of

24 waiting until he gets, until this is approved to move

25 | forward with whatever he's going to do.

25 the KLG breakout that holds water in it?

1 MR. FILOROMO: I don't remember.

MR. SWIKA: For the ballast? Is this the same way or is this suspended trailer like the

4 technical part does for the ballast? Do you

5 understand? Right.

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MR. ARNDT: Right. I don't recall if this has a ballast on it. Yeah, is Tim Horn on the line? He would be able to answer. He's the war for this attraction.

CHAIR: Yeah, Tim Horn - Tim Horn is on the line. Tim, Tim, do you want to have a couple of comments on this and perhaps answer the specific question about ballast?

14 MR. HORN: I do not believe there is 15 water ballast.

CHAIR: Other than that, we're - not much to say unless we have a question for you?

MR. HORN: Yeah, exactly. I mean,
we're familiar with Bojux. Mr. Pepper (phonetic) has
one of their wheels which we had extensive

22 CHAIR: Yeah, we have.

- 25 which typically the Board does not ask for. But I

- 1 can certainly forward a copy of the electronic file
 2 if you'd like to see that.
- $\underline{MR. SWIKA:}$ The reason I asked this,
- 4 and I just saw a video from a different country when
- 5 they ship this out of the box. It was kind of
- 6 terrifying to watch this video of this being shipped
- 7 out of the box. And it was during a test operation,
- 8 | so it did that. But we watch this stuff, and
- 9 sometimes and and the ride, what holds them down,
- 10 security, I mean it means a lot especially the way
- 11 this thing swings.
- 12 CHAIR: I appreciate your insight.
- 13 I'll offer this as consideration for the Board. Joe
- 14 had reached over and made the suggestion that this
- 15 all is contingent upon us actually seeing the ride.
- 16 | So we'll say at this point, Tim, there's nothing
- 17 | further to do than actually receive the ride and let
- 18 him set it up and let us look at it, right? At that
- 19 point, we can say yes or no. At this point
- 20 | conditionally, it's yes, unless we find some fault
- 21 when we see it physically.
- 22 MR. HORN: Well, that sounds like a
- 23 plan to me. We may want to convey that to Mr.
- 24 Pepper.
- 25 CHAIR: I will. We'll we'll put it

- 1 | in writing. It'll be the conditional approval, and
- 2 | we'll outline specifically that prior to it
- 3 operating, it has to be set up and functional. We
- 4 have to witness it.
- 5 MR. HORN: Sounds like a right
- 6 approach at this point.
- 7 CHAIR: Okay.
- Yeah, I don't think we need anything
- 9 further on this from you. Just at this point, he
- 10 needs to receive it, set it up, and make it
- 11 operational, and then invite us to come see it before
- 12 he opens it.
- MR. HORN: All right.
- 14 CHAIR: Thank you, sir.
- MR. HORN: Thank you all for your
- 16 help. Signing off.
- 17 CHAIR: We're going to move on to
- 18 | Proslide, and we'll invite whoever is here for the
- 19 Cannonball 40 up to the microphone. If you're going
- 20 to have a speaking part, that is.
- 21 MR. SAMS: Well, I'm here to answer
- 22 | questions.
- 23 CHAIR: Then you'll have a speaking
- 24 part. So why don't you come on up and have a seat,
- 25 and if we need you. So let's get the introductions

out of the way. If you would turn that microphone on, face our stenographer, introduce yourself, spell your last name, and tell us who and what you are.

 $$\underline{\text{MR. SAMS:}}$$ Hi, my name is William Sams, S-A-M-S, and I'm representing Kalahari for the Cannonball 40.

CHAIR: Okay.

Why don't you just give us, just, like, the thumbnail of what it is, what you've done, where it's at, and what stage you're at in the process?

MR. SAMS: Yes. So the Cannonball 40 has been fully built, and we have operated it under the tentative approval. It is a waterslide that's been built by Proslide numerous times. And it is a one to two person tube slide, where they go through, traverse the tube, and enter into a bowl, and then they spin around, where then they then drop into another slide, which brings them to the catch pool.

CHAIR: Yep. I'd just like to throw a little blanket over from our end. So, this is an already approved model and version of Proslide, but we wrap our arms around site specific. So just because we have an apparatus, a piece of equipment, or a ride, when it's built specifically for location,

- 1 that is part of our oversight program. So Kalahari
- 2 has been an upstanding partner with us to provide all
- 3 the details of the installation and operation, which
- 4 is the other two pieces. So that's Proslide itself
- 5 is approved.
- The installation and operation are the
- 7 two other key pieces for our approval, which is why
- 8 they're here today having this conversation.
- 9 Otherwise, we would not bring this to the Board's
- 10 attention. But we remind the Board as we get into
- 11 this age that rides are designed specifically for
- 12 unique locations and circumstances and built that way
- 13 that we still have a role in it for its approval.
- 14 | It's just not a rubber stamp that they get to do
- 15 | whatever they want. And we appreciate Kalahari just
- 16 showing that. Love to work with you folks now.
- MR. SAMS: Likewise.
- 18 CHAIR: But, it's all good. Any
- 19 questions? I'm sure there might be one or two about
- 20 the Proslide Cannonball 40.
- 21 MR. GORMAN: William right, thank
- 22 | you. This is Steve Gorman. We have a cannonball
- 23 | slide from Proslide as well outside of our track
- 24 (phonetic). And my question is, when you're
- 25 operating it, how do you know when you can dispatch

- 1 the next person? Is it line of sight or do you have 2 sensors?
- MR. SAMS: So we have a light sensor
 for our staff. There is a line of sight possible in
 the event of that failing, which we would use. But
 it currently is operating on a light system.
- MR. GORMAN: Thank you. And then also, it looks like the bowl itself is outside the building?
- MR. SAMS: That is correct.
- MR. GORMAN: So do you run it in the
- 12 | winter time?
- MR. SAMS: Yes, we're an indoor

 facility, so they enter and exit inside. However,

 the bowl and smooth slide is positioned outside.
- MR. GORMAN: So just a curious
 question, the pumps for injectors in the bowl are
 outside? They look like it. So how do you deal with
 it freezing?
- MR. SAMS: So of course, yeah. So
 the the pipes, there are some pipes that are
 outdoor, but they run down into the ground below
 where we have a pump room that they are, the actual
 pump and motors are housed in. There are drainage
 systems put throughout that we are able to drain the

water with this off so that we don't have an issue of freezing and bursting pipe.

MR. GORMAN: Thank you.

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CHAIR: Yeah, we had no issue that you believed to do that. We assumed that you had taken care of all the particulars. You certainly don't want to break your new toy, so.

MR. SAMS: Yes, absolutely.

CHAIR: That was a great question, though. We had similar questions. Isn't that going to be interesting? But yeah, good for you guys. Get to do indoor, outdoor.

Are there any other questions

14 concerning this particular attraction? You're going

15 to tell them the cool news that you're building an

16 entire new? No.

MR. GORMAN: One more - one more question. Are you weighing people for this attraction? Do you have a scale?

MR. SAMS: So for this sort of attraction, we do not have a scale installed. There is a weight requirement that has been tested and set by Proslide, which we will be enforcing, but we do not have a scale currently.

MR. GORMAN: Yeah. For the record, we

- 1 do not either on this attraction.
- 2 CHAIR: Didn't we understand it?
- 3 That's you have to take some of the patron's word
- 4 for something versus trying to put a scale in it.
- 5 Will you put a scale?
- 6 MR. SAMS: I mean, also just for
- 7 | feedback, we have, what, four years operation? I
- 8 don't think we've had an injury on this ride. So
- 9 cross your fingers, it'll still have the same
- 10 experience.
- 11 CHAIR: Can I ask an aside question?
- 12 How's attendance for all the other attractions?
- 13 Maybe the one I'm asking about, but not bringing up.
- 14 MR. SAMS: Well in general, attendance
- 15 for the park it's it's been good. Yeah, we've
- 16 definitely seen a lot of attendance during the
- 17 | holidays. I think this new addition will definitely
- 18 get a lot of buzz and and bring a lot of people out
- 19 moving forward.
- 20 CHAIR: Okay.
- 21 And you already have all the
- 22 | documentation you need from us, so.
- MR. SAMS: Yes.
- 24 CHAIR: Board, any comments concerning
- 25 this? Again, because of the nature of it, it was

- issued a conditional approval. Is there anything 1 2 that would for Board Members that would make them 3 believe that the conditional approval needs some additional work or something else is required at this 4
- 5 point from Kalahari? Appreciate the Board's

throwing their name over the top of it.

6 indulgence. Thank you.

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Sakanac Rock climbing wall. Going to ask the Board Members another great question. many climbing walls do we have or climbing obstacles 10 or climbing attractions? Hundreds, like hundreds, 95 11 percent or more of them are auto belay. Probably 12 more than that. So we have a very small amount that are manual belay, which should hearten most folks. 13 14 But this is another example of manufactured by somebody, bought specifically by somebody, and then 15

So trampoline parks started this trend where they bought equipment that was manufactured internationally. And it was too difficult to have that manufacturer go through the process. purchaser wrapped their arms around it and took ownership of it, put it through its paces to meet Pennsylvania's requirements. Similar in agritourism where they build a one off slide or a one off zip line. The owner is the manufacturer. They have all

- 1 the liability. They have the responsibility of a
 2 professional engineer.
- This is another case for Sakanac Rock
 that this is not a manufactured wall by Sakanac.

 They purchased it or the plans for it. They had a
 local engineer, appropriate local engineer go through
 all the paces with us and they constructed it one off
- 8 on location. And then they met all the requirements 9 for us.

- In this particular case, they have two options. They actually have a bouldering wall, free climb off to the side, a separate entity of the three pieces of the climbing wall with auto belay. So this is your garden fair. Now, I'll remind everybody that the climbing association, I hate to use the word disavow, but it's great for great for conversation. Don't agree that they need to comply with us if they're a gym. Okay? Remember, this is one of those things we would like the law to clarify for us.
- We adamantly disagree that a gym environment excludes them from our oversight because we've never met a gym that doesn't invite an outside customer to have a party or bring a friend. And in that case, they're no longer a gym membership.
- 25 They're a pay per play, which puts them in our realm.

1 | Anyway, I'll jump off my soapbox.

Are there any questions concerning the Sakanac rock climbing wall submission? Basically, if you build it, we'll regulate it. That's just the way it is.

MR. GORMAN: Have you seen it? Has it been inspected by you? I thought you said yes?

CHAIR: Yes, over. Yes, I did. I did the checks for it over and over again actually. They had lots of questions for us. They were interested in not reinventing the wheel themselves, but finding out if we had a good training policy and equipment folks and all that. They were - they were very communicative when they wanted to build and open this, so.

So this is another one that was on a conditional approval, pending Board approved. We just saw no reason to not allow them to operate. Any other comments for the Board? Okay.

We're going to switch gears a little bit here. So there's two housekeeping items. You'll see the Wipeout come up. That's Joe's domain. I'm going to jump in, post that, talk a little bit about continuing education, and then we're going to end the show with Waldameer.

So, Joe, if you would move on to what

- it's not Urban Air specific, but it was brought up

when we were looking at Urban Air. There are other

people who operate similar rides.

MR. FILOROMO: Okay.

CHAIR: Right? So, Joe, would you turn your mic on and then give us a little bit of background of why Wipeout is on here and why we thought it was important to bring to Board Members?

MR. FILOROMO: Okay.

We don't have my memo, do we?

MS. BROWN: It's behind you.

CHAIR: Yeah, they've seen it.

14 | They've been provided.

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MR. FILOROMO: Okay.

Wipeout's that's the thing where this
big bar flings around. They have to - they stand on
a pedestal and try not to get knocked off. And we've
had them operating the state for years over airbags,
inflatable. And with them, they've been safe if
they're operated properly. It was all how they're
operating.

The new thing that has happened is trampoline parks have -

CHAIR: Stop.

MR. FILOROMO: - brought the mechanism and put it over trampolines instead of inflatables. And then put their name on it as the manufacturer. The inflatable is a device that absorbs impact. trampoline is a device that does not. It rebounds the impact. And so, there's been nationwide noticeable amount of more serious injuries as people fall off of the pedestal and then land on the trampoline.

And a couple of states have addressed this, and the manufacturer addressed it. So you'll see that I put this together here, explaining what I've just said pretty much, probably spoken better than I just did. But explaining that we're not - we want - we're going to discontinue allowing this, and they need to use the retrofit, which is second page.

Per Urban Air, Urban Air has come up with a fix for this if the state does decide not to accept the trampolines. So they have a procedure here to basically cover up where the mechanism was and just use it as a trampoline park.

The - we've talked to trampoline park owners around the state. We don't - we don't seem to get any pushback on this. I don't see how we'd get any pushback from Urban Air being that they put this

memo together, this bullet. So that's the situation.

It's a dangerous situation, the trampoline parks, as

usual. And this is how we hope to fix it.

CHAIR: A couple dozen, less - less than two dozen, but they're out there as far as what we know that's registered. But again, to - we are always on the lookout. And just because an issue or accident or a concern arises outside of Pennsylvania doesn't mean we're not paying attention. This is merely a reminder that we're ever vigilant. Right?

So your input matters. If you hear

something that you think we may not be aware of, please reach out to us. We don't want it to happen here. So if we can get in front of it, we absolutely want to do that.

There is another item that we're going to bring up to the next Board meetings. We're not 100 percent ready on how to address it, but this year we have seen nationwide, but also Pennsylvania, quite a few hazards dealing with zip lines. The interaction of an individual mounting and traversing a zip line. Pennsylvania has had at least three serious and one, we consider serious, issues with either while zipping or at the beginning of the zip and falling.

So we're going back to the drawing 1 2 Joe's reached out and received ACCT board. regulation to scour that to make sure we're not 3 missing anything that should have been enforced. 4 5 Talking with some of the engineers that are involved 6 with producing these, the manufacturers, what we're 7 thinking about to offer to the board for consideration, or if the board has ideas, we're asking you today to think about it and send it to us. 10 It is a two trolley system where the primary and 11 redundant safety is not tied to the same mechanism. 12 So when we first approved zip lines, same as the five point harness, they had a primary 13 14 safety line that was attached that it should be 15 tamper resistant, and the secondary safety line on the person was also attached to the same trolley or 16 17 Newer ones for traversing high ropes course 18 and zip lines have two separate mechanisms, so if one 19 fails, the other one should not. Right? It's not 20 relying on the same line. 21 So we're trying to figure out how that works and how we institute a safety protocol that 22 23 lessens or mitigates the likelihood of fall hazards. 24 They were almost back to back this summer. Like, if 25 one weekend we responded to a 25 foot fall out of a

tower, and it was almost a week and a day later that 1 2 we had another 30 or 35 foot fall, mid zip.

3 So fortunate, you know, we talk death is the ultimate worst. Obviously, there was 4 5 significant injury to at least one of those two that I related, but no death. So we were definitely 6 7 trying to figure out how do we - how do we do better. So we'll have something, I think, in writing for the Board to review and consider. Moving forward, this 10 will be hopefully in concert to what other 11 manufacturers in other states might be thinking 12 about. And if nobody else is, we are, because we definitely have to do something about it.

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It's - I think we've been very fortunate, and we've seen what can happen both if the rider is able to access their equipment, which in one case, we think might have occurred. So in a lot of these courses, especially if high ropes and zip all at the same activity, and you're harnessed in once, but you're allowed to traverse a course by yourself and navigate to different obstacles and different levels of difficulty that that person along the way could interact with their safety equipment. And we noted that as the rider interacted with the different pieces, levels of rope course or the zip line, that

- 1 they were just making sure that they were attached.
- 2 | They weren't relooking at their safety equipment to
- 3 make sure it was affixed properly.
- 4 So the rider somehow managed to adjust
- 5 | themselves or left the course for a break or
- 6 something and then got back on the course without
- 7 being observed. So we did take immediate issue with
- 8 some locations to change their operational
- 9 procedures. But our concern is that it's a larger
- 10 issue, not just the operational place that we've
- 11 identified. So that's some of the behind the scenes
- 12 stuff going on.
- MR. ZHANG: Okay.
- 14 Folks, I'm sorry to interrupt your
- 15 conversation. My name is Jesse. I'm the owner of
- 16 the trampoline park of Nova Trampoline in Wyoming,
- 17 Pennsylvania.
- There's two issues that I'm having
- 19 trouble with. One is the ninja course, and one is
- 20 the rope course. I know that the office want us to
- 21 | solve you guys an impact force on the ninja course,
- 22 | which is in warnings. I did have my engineer wrote
- 23 you guys a letter, and I don't know, somehow this is
- 24 not the way that you guys looking for or not the way
- 25 that he word it. And I am aware that Randall and

Tony, that they both came up to my park and we walked through the park. We - he addressed other the problems.

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CHAIR: He's the ninja, right? $\underline{\text{MR. ZHANG:}} \quad \text{And we fixed all the - fix}$ all the problems and the concerns at the park.

 $\underline{\text{CHAIR:}}$ He doesn't know we said yes.

MS. BROWN: He didn't get it yet.

9 A week after also, Tony MR. ZHANG: 10 came back and reinspect. He walked through the park 11 again and all the problem was addressed from Randall 12 was fixed. So I do not know why these two attendees is still in the original Board meeting today. 13 That's 14 why I'm calling in and jumping into this 15 conversation, see if there's anything we can do to moving this forward. 16

CHAIR: Thank you. I appreciate you. Thank you for taking the time to jump on here real quick. I - I will rewind on your behalf because I know that we were reaching out to you earlier to get you on.

We - we have already gone through Angel Playground, both the ninja and rope course.

MR. ZHANG: Yeah.

CHAIR: And we - we have all of the

1 required needs from our end. We have some paperwork

2 that needs to be updated, but it doesn't affect your

3 ability to operate under your conditional approval.

4 | So you are more than welcome to continue operating as

5 you have been. We have some paperwork, housekeeping

6 | items we need you to update us on, but that will not

7 affect your ability to operate.

Is that satisfying?

MR. ZHANG: Understand. Okay.

Understand. In the meantime, I want

11 to keep you in the loop. I actually contacted Angel

12 Playground last week, and they are actually having

13 someone doing a newer version of the impact force for

14 the ninja course. So hopefully they will have it to

15 me by the end of this week, and I will have Tony look

16 at it, see if that's the stuff that you guys are

17 looking for.

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CHAIR: Yeah. Excellent. We

19 appreciate your diligence in working with us. Again,

20 you're going to be able to continue to operate as we

21 update your submission and - and get your manual to

22 where it needs to be. Other than that, today is for

23 you, today is successful, and that we're - we're

24 going to get to the finish line for you and get you

25 open and operational with everything we need.

- 1 MR. ZHANG: Great. Thank you so much
- 2 for your time.
- 3 CHAIR: Thank you.
- 4 MR. ZHANG: Yep. You have a good day.
- 5 Thank you.
- 6 CHAIR: I'd like to invite the
- 7 representatives of Waldameer to the microphone if
- 8 | they are indeed speaking, or if you're going to speak
- 9 on their behalf, or both.
- MR. GORMAN: This is Steve Gorman.
- 11 | So, I'm here as a representative from Waldameer just
- 12 to inform the Board that we plan in March to have a
- 13 review of two of our existing rides. We are updating
- 14 the control systems on both of those. The picture
- 15 you see here is our wooden coaster that's 60 years
- 16 old. It's just a picture to show you.
- 17 CHAIR: I love that coaster. I love
- 18 that coaster.
- MR. GORMAN: Just the longer story is
- 20 the control system was installed, I believe they've
- 21 only done two roller coasters ever in their career,
- 22 | you know, and we use them. And they actually, our
- 23 expertise is baggage handling. So it just hasn't
- 24 worked out like we wanted to. We spent a lot of
- 25 troubleshooting that we have to deal with. So we're

- going to convert to someone who's more expertise in the amusement industry, park manager onto it. So that's one ride.
- The second ride is our 38 year old, 38 4 5 year old log flume ride. And same, this ride, the 6 control system was done by OD Hopkins, the original 7 manufacturer, and we are updating it with WhiteWater west, who bought OD Hopkins. We just thought it was time, just all the wires are old and the sensors are 10 old. And we're going to update the control system so 11 it'll be more modern. No changes to the dynamics of 12 the ride, just changing the control system so it's easier for us to troubleshoot and control the ride. 13
 - CHAIR: Watch, I'm going to beat up Joe. Joe, in your professional opinion, major modification or just notification?

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- MR. FILOROMO: Well, by definition, without a change in the dynamics of the ride, no.

 But on the other hand, if the operations change or the maintenance, we would just like to have an update of the manual to reflect those changes.
- CHAIR: So, yes, I agree as long as you keep us informed of the progress. And if there is no change other than the controlling system, that that does not change the dynamics, keeping us

1 | informed is appreciated.

MR. GORMAN: Okay.

When we have all that proper manual stuff, we will share that with you. It should be well in advance if you need it.

CHAIR: We will have the opportunity for Board comments. I have two other items, and then I will turn the rest over to the Board Members.

Reminder, if you are in attendance here and you have not signed in, there is a sign in sheet somewhere in the room. We'd appreciate you taking a moment to sign in. Board Members with expenses, expense vouchers to Yvonne, please at your convenience, or if you need assistance filling out your expense vouchers, we actually have figured it out. Getting people paid. I actually saw it happen. So, appreciate again your patience and your indulgence, but expense vouchers to Ms. Yvonne.

And before I ask for Board Member comments, I want to offer one more thing that you might want to comment on. In September, I, on behalf of the Division, changed methodology for continuing education. For approval of continuing education.

So, as you may or may not be aware, Pennsylvania is one of those states that if you're an amusement ride

- qualified safety inspector that you take a test for whatever level of inspector licensure that you believe or desire you need for the type of rides or attractions that you operate.
- 5 We will test you. You'll pass the 6 test with a 70 percent. And if you remain 7 continually licensed over your three year period and renew your license, you won't have to test again unless something crazy happens. But typically, if 10 your license doesn't expire, you don't have to test. 11 But in that three year period, you have to get a 12 certain number of approved continuing education credits in that time frame. As little as 16 hours in 13 14 a three year period, all the way up to 48 hours in a 15 three year period. But most people land about 24 That's the median for 90 percent or more. 16 hours.
- That covers the majority of people
 that we have as affiliated inspectors, level one and
 the minority of level two inspectors who have a
 little bit more of a continuing education
 requirement.
 - We, the Division, do not provide training. We can and had in the very beginning, in the past, but we do not because there is other acceptable training opportunities out there. And

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there is a described policy on what continuing education approval for our program requirements look like. And we issue that to anybody who is interested in providing continuing education credits, and if they meet the outlined requirements and the time frames, and our ability to audit their training, we award continuing education based on the attendance of the individual and the training certificate issued by that program.

- So as of September, we realized that we were doing it correctly in state and probably less so out of state. And what I mean by that is, is part of our program, most programs, not all, is the ability to audit, to make sure that what is offered as continuing education is actually what is occurring. Right? So that means attendance, whether participating attendance or an audit role of attendance, you're actually showing that what's being offered on paper is actually what's being given to students.
- And inside Pennsylvania, we have always been invited to and regularly attend all of the training events that occur. Right? It's not always all for all the time, but always invited, have a relationship with the parks that offer their own

and with the programs that offer their own,

specifically pay seminar and the amusement rides

safety seminar, two of the primary ways continuing

ducation is offered in Pennsylvania.

But there are some continuing education that does occur out of state. To name a few AIMS, national NAARSO, Northwest Shelton (phonetic) as a few that we have issued continuing education approval for - for their programs in the past.

This year, I reached out and had spoken to all three organizations that moving forward, we're going to stay within our 90 day ask of when training's going to occur, and then our window of receiving all the documentation, which is biographies of instructors, curriculum, schedule of events, that kind of stuff, and that they will issue a certificate. Right? And that they will have some kind of attendance policy that we agree with, that we are able to attend and audit courses that are out of state.

So for us moving forward, wanting to step up onto the national stage, our attendance is required for us to issue continuing education for all, not just in state, but out of state. And that

- 1 was the change. And I was received very well with
- 2 the folks I spoke with. Everybody kind of gets it.
- 3 It makes sense what's going on. That's why it's
- 4 important to meet the timelines for us, at least
- 5 notifying us when training is going to occur out of
- 6 state so we can work on what Pennsylvania would deem
- 7 as cumbersome to get travel arrangements and to get
- 8 people in the pipeline for attendance. Right?
- 9 So I feel comfortable speaking to Fred
- 10 Strathmeyer, who was just here, that we'll absolutely
- 11 have the funding and the ability to travel, barring
- 12 the budget impasses where travel is restricted.
- 13 Right? But short of that, he completely supports our
- 14 attendance at these continuing education
- 15 opportunities, understands our need to be there to
- 16 play that audit role and to participate in those
- 17 activities that will directly benefit and affect
- 18 Pennsylvania inspectors. So that's the direction
- 19 we've moved. We've issued that notice to the people
- 20 that we've dealt with in the past, and that's how
- 21 | we're going to proceed moving forward.
- Now, I'll offer this as the time where
- 23 Board Members, I'll invite you to make comments on
- 24 our behalf. I just want to say one last piece, that
- 25 I appreciate each and every one of you, the time and

effort that you put in, even with the calling in. I
just had a little conversation with our engineer and
Mr. Pittman. If we need to help folks figure out
their individual computer issues, and we'll do a dry
run of a Board meeting to make sure everybody's good
with signing on and there's no issues.

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I don't know what the problem was. Wе use this all the time, but we're very familiar with Teams and it's idiosyncrasies. So folks who may not use these on the regular could jump on the phone number and call in. But if you're not familiar with Teams and that option, then that's a failure on our part, and we'd like to fix that moving forward. So we'll be - you'll see me reaching out to you saying, hey, do you have a comfort level of doing it by And if so, we would just sign on for a quick Teams? ten minute trial run and answer any questions, make sure that you guys can maneuver around Teams easily and we don't keep having the starving faux pause of 10 or 15 minutes while we try to figure out if folks can hear us. All right.

I open it up to Board Members for their comments, questions, concerns. Yep. Mr. Hall, as always.

MR. HALL: Yes, good morning. Bill

- 1 | Hall, public member. A point of information,
- 2 probably for Joe and Randall. I was reading about a
- 3 | Willow Grove Park Mall in Suburban Philadelphia and
- 4 | Preit Property, P-R-E-I-T, which is facing some sort
- 5 of financial issues. And a former JCPenney store is
- 6 being advertised as a fun spot. It's going to have
- 7 arcades and games and this buried in there, which
- 8 there will also be bumper cars, which falls within
- 9 our purview.
- 10 My question is, how do we find out
- 11 about that? Do they notify us or we just stumble
- 12 across it? Or somebody tells us, like I'm telling
- 13 you?
- 14 MR. FILOROMO: We just stumble across
- 15 it. We're right now, be being the Christmas
- 16 | season, we're doing a sweep of all the malls because
- 17 of rides in malls. Hopefully we would have caught
- 18 it. But problem with malls is they have a very high
- 19 turnover in their management, and we will have them
- 20 up to speed of what's required. And the next month,
- 21 | we have different people in there and they don't even
- 22 | and they they just build stuff and they don't
- 23 even realize it's regulated.
- 24 So we need to kind of keep an eye on
- 25 it. And so once, during this time of year is when we

- kind of try to check every mall for stuff. 1 2 yeah, we need to.
- 3 MR. HALL: Well, thank you. Second point. 4 I saw an ad in the Philadelphia Media a few 5 months ago about a huge Bounce America attraction of 6 the old Philadelphia Navy Yard. And I wasn't aware 7 that we were cognizant of that fact. And I sent Walter an email, and he said there are several of 9 these already operated in the Commonwealth and we 10 were aware of them.
- 11 I've been here a long time. I may have missed that one, but my goodness, if it was a 12 Big Bounce America, and I wondered if you fellows 13 14 ever go and inspect those things.

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- I'm going to jump in and just CHAIR: 16 categorize why I answered. They know, and I'm sure 17 they're going to answer and not make me look foolish. Yes, I'm sure.
 - Rarely do we bring inflatables to the Board, not to district, Mr. Batchuss (phonetic), or the industry as a whole. But it's pretty cookie cutter, cut and form, right? We rarely see anything that we haven't seen before. These ginormous ones like Slide Philadelphia, Slide Pittsburgh, that go down blocks and blocks are really just 40 foot pieces

- strung together over and over again. These 100 foot ones are really 25 by 25 pieces that are fit together, some enclosed, some not enclosed, some for
- 4 art, some not.
- So the answer is, it's always cool to go see. And I would venture to say he's going to say yes, I'm giving him my answer already, that we come to see them. But we yeah, we do have some that are ginormous, 100 foot by 100 foot or, you know, the length of a street, which is ridiculous, by the way. But, have have you gone to see giant inflatables before, Randall or?

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- MR. ARNDT: Yes. I've been I wasn't at the one at the Navy Yard, but I was at the one, the same company had it in King of Prussia at the mall. And so I've I've been there as a quality assurance inspection. And Gary Chuck back there, he has done the actual inspection for for compliance. We've been aware of them and went through the proof of process, as Paul mentioned, and have them do inspections.
- MR. HALL: Are they successful as far as patrons? Daren's (phonetic) shaking his head.
- MR. ARNDT: Yeah, they tell me they're successful and they've been in a couple of places, so

1 | I'm glad to say, yeah, they wouldn't be coming back.

CHAIR: Well, I have to say I - I saw
one that was successful to the point that I
intervened. This is just a personal story. So I
went to see some events at Hershey arena. So the
inside one, and they had a big one operating and it
was a free for all. Like, so one - one would say
that whatever the rules were, they decided there was

9 no rules. So if you had a wristband and you paid a
10 certain price, kids out of the drove. So it was
11 actually before circus. So it was a few years ago.

And I politely introduced myself.

Unfortunately, I was carrying my credentials at the time, interacted with some very nice folks over at Hershey, and politely, they made the announcement, and took the air out of it. It was - my son wanted to go down, right? He was young and small. It was complete mayhem. You had, you know, 15 year-olds the size of adults to toddlers running through this with no regard to volume of people, size or anything. So I had to say nay. You have to operate it within some reasonable expectation of safety, so.

They were kind enough to not make a big issue of it. You know, it wasn't that big of a deal because it was a pre to the show, but they're

1 everywhere, and surprisingly so. Baseball games, big 2 events, they keep getting bigger for some reason.

3 MR. HALL: My third and final point, some years ago, we had flyers being distributed by 4 5 this agency, the Agriculture Department, and 6 stressing public ride safety. And I haven't seen 7 I used to pick it up out here at the brochure that. spot outside the elevator. Yvonne is shaking her 9 I wonder, do we still have that? And is there 10 a distribution process for that?

Okay, well, that answers my question.

It's not available, it's not available. But I

wondered how they would distribute it if you go to

parades or festivals or fairs, but if it's not there,

it's not there. So, I'm done. Thank you.

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CHAIR: It always a pleasure. Every time you call, please continue. You actually read the newspaper and go through social media in your area, and your area is huge for events that typically may not be aware of the requirement of regulatory oversight. So please continue, and we appreciate it. Comments?

MR. GORMAN: Well, the showman at the farm show, when they do their carousel project, we give out a coloring book which promotes safety at the

parks and at the carnivals. Just coloring books for kids, don't run, don't fall or you know. So we do a little bit of that. And years ago, when I worked there, we used - you used to give them to me and I would drop off at the rest areas that brochure you're talking about, but probably gone by the way of the

budget. You know how that goes.

CHAIR: You make a great point that I want to offer to Board Members. The one thing I think that I am absolutely, I won't say failed, think I can do a lot better is promotion. Promotion of what we do and how we do it. So reaching out to media events and telling folks what the program entails. You know, not just when we're interacting with potential owners and operators, but the public, right? So more people that know, the better. It keeps us.

Once upon a time, Joe was very efficient and had exactly what we're talking about, coloring books. He had handouts. This was in the infancy of the program, when he had darker hair. And he had constantly, when I first came on board, said, you know, where is this? Where, you know, where is these documents? And we've fallen by the wayside.

We absolutely need to up our game with

our public outreach, our social media, and our media kit for interacting with people. That I said, if there's one downfall as a director that I haven't, and that's any of my programs that I've concentrated on, is they do a terrible job of saying how good we I'm just saying, right? So, I mean, there are media kits out there for a variety of industries. And this is one of the success stories that we should highlight as often as we can, especially as it comes around, you know, big fall season.

We - there's a lot of things that we can do proactively and productively to tell folks about our program, and I feel like that's something that we really have to up our game on. And I appreciate the sentiment about the coloring book and what it means. Getting that information out to the public simply to ask ride operators for the PA ID plate, or knowing that when you see that year and the PA ride ID plate on it, that it's registered with us and part of registration that it's insured, and that they're - that we're aware that they have a certified inspector and that likely we can look up the last time it was inspected and where it was and who owns it.

You know, these - these couple of

- 1 things, you know, point people towards people who are
- 2 doing it correctly versus people who are coming in
- 3 from outside the state and don't have any knowledge.
- 4 And it gets us information of unsafe, potential,
- 5 unsafe activities sooner. So, there's a lot of good
- 6 to be said for your comments and I appreciate that.
- 7 Any other Board Members with comments?
- 8 Thank you, Mr. Gorman.
- 9 MR. GORMAN: Well, that makes me think
- 10 you said, William, it makes me think of the annual
- 11 report that you have put out before about incidents
- 12 you've had during that season. So when that becomes
- 13 available, is it good to share with the Board?
- MR. FILOROMO: That's normally in
- 15 January.
- MR. GORMAN: Yeah. Okay, great.
- 17 CHAIR: Another excellent point.
- 18 Right? That's it would be great if OBA or Industry
- 19 would kind of come up with a standardized litmus test
- 20 on how well or poorly a program is doing. But
- 21 considering, I know, I can tell you why, but
- 22 considering Pennsylvania does things that no other
- 23 state does, and some states do things that we don't
- 24 do. Right? Or the method and means in which they
- 25 track incidents. And some states, pardon me for

1 using his terms, is a pay per play. Like, as long as

2 you pay for the registration, there's no approval or

3 registration process other than paying. Some states

4 do it themselves, some states farm out the work. So

5 | there's - there's really no standardization.

So we are unto ourselves, right? So

7 | it's just an interesting dynamic, the way the

8 | industry operates in a variety of jurisdictions.

9 Personally, I think based on the program, the Board,

10 all the time and effort of all the operators and

11 owners, not going to beat us. I mean, just that's my

12 personal take on it. Thank you, Mr. Gorman.

Any other Board Members with

14 questions, comments? Hearing none, I'm going to bite

15 | my tongue and I'm going to offer public opportunity

16 | for comments. I'm not even going to look at you,

17 | Gary.

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18 MR. FILOROMO: Why'd you do that?

19 CHAIR: Because I can, and it's not

20 the wrong - nothing. If you do, you have to come up

21 to the microphone. You have to identify yourself,

22 but you have to.

MR. FILOROMO: Here we go.

24 CHAIR: It's okay to say thank you for

25 answering my questions. I don't have any further

1 questions.

MR. CHUBB: I'm Gary Chubb, C-H-U-B-B.

Just quickly on the Pittsburgh Safety Seminar. It

was held out in Pittsburgh area, Monroeville on,

let's see, October 30th through the 2nd of November.

6 Our attendance was a little light. The day's seminar 7 is supposed to be noticed, sponsored by the

8 Pennsylvania State Showman's Association and the 9 Pennsylvania Amusement Parks Association.

This year we had the classes at the DoubleTree in Monroeville. We went to Kennywood for a day and had a good time out there. We looked at 12 different rides, and we were fortunate enough to have participants from the states on the state QA inspectors were there, Tony and Lehigh, Yvonne was there as a representative of the Department. And we certainly appreciate everybody's assistance. So I think overall, things went very well.

We had instructors from the National Association of Safety Officials, NAARSO for short, and we have a variety of - of parks and traveling shows, but like I said, attendance was a little light. We had 55 persons attend altogether. We had a variety of classes, anything from rich rides to basic DMC and ladder logic. We talked about ASPM,

S770, basic NDT, comprehensive evaluation, signage, environment, that type of thing. So altogether, like I said, I think it was a very good seminar.

We had a number of sponsors and we certainly appreciate all the sponsors that help put that seminar together. Our team will recognize Tom Reebie from Philadelphia Toboggan Coaster continues to be a big, big supporter and sponsor. So, thank you Tom.

That's all I have on the PACE so far.

I do have another question. I recently been made aware of a new Urban Air opening up in Harrisburg on Derry Street. And I was just wondering, does the new Urban Air have any QA inspectors that - I know the website says coming soon. And during the meeting here, I was contacted by one of the organizations that I do inspections with to see if I can do a preopening inspection. So, I don't know if they registered with the state yet or not. And maybe I can find that out after this meeting.

CHAIR: Yep. You just went one step too far. Thank you for your comments, but happy to answer your questions after we close the meeting.

MR. CHUBB: Yes, yes, yes. Thank you.

CHAIR: Sure. I won't say this is my

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favorite time, but it ranks right up there with lunch. Does the Board Member have a motion for adjournment? Sir, yes, sir.

MR. SHAW: This is Derek Shaw - Walter Shaw, S-H-A-W, with Amusement Today. I have a brief recap for you about the Golden Ticket Awards this year, which there were many Pennsylvania winners.

CHAIR: Yeah, I - we would - we would love to hear you from you, sure. Hang on a moment. Our stenographer is dutifully getting back. She's probably having a difficult time hearing you, so we're going to be quiet on our end to give you the stage. Derek Shaw is a writer, it's S-H-A-W. His name is up there for one of the periodicals. He offers a lot of amusement ride content to a variety of sources. And he's going to tell us about how well Pennsylvania did this past year. Go ahead, Mr. Shaw.

MR. SHAW: Okay.

Well, the Golden Ticket Awards have been around for 25 years. It's put out in our Amusement Today newspaper, of which I handle primarily the fair and carnival side of things.

So we held our awards this year at Dollywood. And the Golden Tickets are an award system where 800 people worldwide are given ballots.

- 1 I'm not one of them because I work in the newspaper.
- 2 | And they have 21 categories that they select the best
- 3 of.
- 4 And in the wooden roller coaster
- 5 category, for the fifth year in a row, Phoenix at
- 6 Knoebels Amusement Resort took number one. Number
- 7 eight was the Ravine Flyer II of Waldameer Park; 15,
- 8 | Jack Rabbit at Kennywood; 18, Thunderbolt at
- 9 Kennywood; number 22, Lightning Racer at Hershey
- 10 Park; number 23, Flying Turns at Knoebels.
- In the steel side of things, 12th best
- 12 roller coaster in the world went to Phantom's Revenge
- 13 in Kennywood. Number 24 was Candymonium at Hershey
- 14 Park.
- Best family park for two or three
- 16 years in a row now, Dutch Wonderland. The best new
- 17 | water ride, Rocket Blast at Waldameer Park. Best
- 18 | quest experience, second best in the world, Knoebels
- 19 Amusement Resort. Best dark ride, second best in the
- 20 world went to Knoebels Amusement Resort with a
- 21 | haunted mansion. Best food went to Knoebels.
- There also were some legends awards.
- 23 Claire Hain and Mike Boodley from Great Coasters
- 24 | International Incorporated in Chesterville, which is
- 25 a suburb of Sunbury, won a legends award as well as

- 1 Jack and Pete Herschend, who originally started
- 2 | Silver Dollar City. And in 1982, they partnered with
- 3 Dolly Parton to rename their park Dollywood. And
- 4 yes, Dolly Parton was there as well. And yes, she
- 5 sang a song, too.
- Publisher's pick went to the
- 7 Renaissance Award went to Kennywood for their
- 8 | makeover, repaint, and signage, restored park
- 9 elements.
- 10 And so that's kind of a summary of
- 11 some rewards. A lot of the Pennsylvania winners.
- 12 And this coming year, the 2024 Golden Ticket Awards
- 13 | will be at Kennywood, September 6th and 7th. It's a
- 14 | free event and anyone is welcome to attend if they
- 15 | would like. That's what I got.
- 16 CHAIR: Super timely with that, Mr.
- 17 | Shaw. I appreciate both the summary and the reminder
- 18 of the invite. So that's awesome, 6th and 7th,
- 19 Kennywood. Show up, no ticket necessary.
- MS. BROWN: I was just there.
- 21 CHAIR: You were. You you guys were
- 22 | just there. Mr. Shaw, where is that published at or
- 23 | is it published?
- 24 MR. SHAW: The Golden Ticket Awards,
- 25 | we have a special issue. If you go to
